Xylazine in the District

- Presented data trends related to overdoses and the drug supply that are most value for the community to know.
- Provided effective actions the public can take to detect someone with xylazine in their system and how to provide proper aid to them.

Sari Frankel, Department of Behavioral Health (DBH)

Naloxone Overthe-Counter

- Shared news of naloxone being Food and Drug Administration (FDA)
 approved to be sold overthe-counter (OTC); going into effect late summer
 2023.
- DBH will continue to review naloxone program policies and local legislation in preparation of OTC launch.
- Funding levels for naloxone will remain the same to support widespreadistribution.

Each OSG Breakout group focused oneviewing the current LLDC strategies and had a discussion on how they would revise update their existing strategies as LLDC is working towards an updated strategic plan that is to be released later in the year.


The following slides summarize the highlights from each breakout conversation on what new, revised, or continuing strategies each group is most excited about the updated plan.





Prevention-Discussion Report Out

- Participants discussed how education and workforce-related strategies under prevention may not always be prevention related. They discussed ways to best capture the workforce development part of the strategy.
- Participants also discussed how they can effectively get information out to communities about the work LLDC is doing when it comes to prevention.
 - Need: A communication plan for the broader community for increased participation

Harm Reduction-Discussion Report Out

- Participants discussed how they can establish a working group discussion around the topic of harm reduction.
- Participants also discussed opportunities to build more 24/7 safe spaces for those who actively use drugs in the area.
 - Key question: What is attainable in the current climate?





Treatment-Discussion Report Out

- Participants discussed integration of behavioral and physical health from the system level down to the direct care teams, including informal treatment levels.
- Participants also discussed screening and treatment for pregnant and parenting individuals.
- Finally, the group discussed opportunities for continued provider education around substance use disorders (SUD).





Recovery-Discussion Report Out

- Participants looked at connecting with some of the other OSGs more frequently for knowledge sharing and connecting potential threads.
- The group discussed 14 new recovery strategies that will be condensed over time through more discussion.
 - One of the strategies they added was looking at linking the DC community to the national recovery communities.
- Participants discussed educating the peer workforce and moving towards a national certification.
 - Stressed the importance of providing trainings and the workforce continuing their education and training.




Screenshot from the Recovery breakout discussion.





Interdiction and Criminal Justice Discussion Report Out

- Participants discussed how they might refine the language used in existing strategies, making them more concise and easier to comprehend.
- Participants also discussed how they might find a mechanism to create a common understanding of what the function is of various agencies, how they interact with the behavioral health systems, and addressing rumors about what they do and don't do.
- Participants are interested in engaging peer navigators throughout the justice system, and identifying the points where they would be most beneficial looking at how to have the right individuals at the table for those discussions.
